The importance of our collection and conservation efforts is very poignant now. Fred, pictured here, died on 24 May from renal failure and complications of old age. He was our oldest lemur, at 24 years of age. Fred was one of very few Sanford Lemurs left in the world,

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in captivity or in the wild. He is emblematic of the life and death conservation crisis for lemurs, the most endangered primate in the world.

Trees play an important role at the Myakka City Lemur Reserve. Since lemurs walk along tree branches and jump from tree to tree the horizontal branches of our oak trees are the perfect addition to their habitat.

For our young lemurs learning to navigate the forest, tree limbs act as a natural playground as mom watches from nearby. They learn little by little to climb higher and higher as the weeks go by... even if they do start by hanging upside down.



Over the years staff and volunteers have planted hundreds of Florida Native trees at the lemur reserve. Planting trees benefits the lemurs in their habitat while also benefiting the Earth. 
